Welcoming International Neighbors to WEAG

Can you imagine how overwhelming it would be to leave family and friends and move to a country where you don't know the language, the culture, or anyone? Imagine how overwhelming tasks like finding housing, employment, driving, shopping, banking, and the school system would be if you could not speak the local language. Would you be brave enough to step into a church, mosque or temple to learn the language and culture of your new country? Over 100 people do just that each Thursday night as they courageously step through the doors of WEAG to learn English.

Each week, volunteer teachers share Jesus' love with our international community as they guide six classes of students through lessons designed to accommodate different levels of understanding. Each student has a story. Each student has taken the bold step to strive to learn English and adapt to our culture.

Many students are from Venezuela. Political turmoil and hyperinflation have led to increased poverty, education decline, and shortages of medicine, water and electricity, as well as violence and protests. Nearly 5000 people escape from Venezuela each day in hopes of a better life. Jhony, Yudith, and Rosa are three such people. Rosa says, "My family live in Venezuela. I miss they very much. I love my family and I work hard for send money to they."

Fleur, a refugee from the Democratic Republic of Congo and seven months pregnant, came to class after being in the United States for less than one week. Her mother, father, and brothers came with her, but her husband is still in the Congo. Her prayer is that her husband can join her and their new baby soon.

Richmond has many immigrants and refugees, and we have the opportunity to develop relationships with them and help them assimilate into their new community.

People from over 30 other countries take time out of their busy weeks to come to English class. They not only receive a great English class, but also teachers and volunteers who care deeply about them and their families. These volunteers embody what Galatians 5:14 says, "For the entire law is fulfilled in keeping this one command: "Love your neighbor as yourself."

Global Handcrafts with a Purpose

Acts 9:36 says, "In Joppa there was a disciple named Tabitha (which translated is Dorcas) who was always doing good and helping the poor." Desiring to follow in her footsteps, Dorcas' Daughters at WEAG began in June 2016 with a handful of ladies. We have grown exponentially since then!

Dorcas is a group of women endeavoring to help those less fortunate by using our crafting skills. Partnering with local and foreign mission ministries to reach the poor by recycling plastic bags into woven sleeping mats for the homeless, braiding jump ropes, and selling one-of-a-kind tote bags, baskets and novelty items. Since



expanding into sewing, we sew simple dresses, shorts and sustainable feminine hygiene kits. These kits allow school-age girls in third world countries to stay in school and not miss a week of learning. Each month we partner with local assisted living homes where engaged residents give back to others by making PBJ sandwiches and/or prepping the crumpled plastic bags. From time to time, we invite speakers from other local organizations and churches to build community.

Local Projects

Henrico County and Richmond City School Partnerships

It's a privilege to partner with two local schools. Our neighbor,
Quioccasin Middle School in Henrico and John Marshall High School
in Richmond City, both need our help. Donations of school supplies,
age-appropriate clothing, food and holiday dinners from our Feeding
the 5000 program are administered by the guidance department,
making certain those with the most need benefit from donations.
It's difficult to concentrate on your studies when you are hungry or
don't have the resources needed to purchase required supplies.

Nabs, chips, pretzels, small cans of fruit, trail mix, juice boxes and nutritious breakfast bars help hungry children begin and get through their school day. Our partnership with WEAG's Love Cupboard allows us to help stock food pantries at both John Marshall High School and Quioccasin Middle School, as well as prepare take home bags for the students with the greatest needs. School staff members are grateful for food donations to supplement meals for hungry middle and high school students.

Healthy non-perishable snacks are always in short supply and high demand. Donations are collected each week all year long. Your gifts can be left at any Mission bin and are shared as needed with both schools. Help support these local schools and their students throughout the year.

Helping the Homeless and Hungry Friends of the Homeless

Our local chapter of Friends of the Homeless allows WEAGers to prepare and serve lunches at Greater Mt. Moriah Baptist Church on First Street in Richmond. The Wednesday and Thursday meal rotations provide a healthy lunch for our inner city neighbors in need.



If you can cook, serve or provide a specific menu item, we would love to have your help! It's easy to make a casserole from a provided recipe one, two or even twelve times a year. Your entree is then placed in the FOH refrigerator right before your rotation. Side dishes, desserts and serving products, as well as many helpers, are needed to serve meals and pray with guests. We have a wonderful time together showing Christ's love while providing a meal to hungry people.

Monthly Caritas Furniture Bank Work Days

WEAGers assist warehouse workers as they organize donations for the CARITAS Furniture Bank. We sort



and restock the store and also repair and restore furniture the first Wednesday of each month.

As families move out of the CARITAS program into affordable housing, they are allowed to select a minimum amount of furnishings and household goods for their new apartment. Volunteers act as "shopping" assistants – making it easier for guests

Almost every day, each of us encounter people asking for money – standing in the median strip as we wait at a traffic light or as we walk down the street. Their needs are many, but are we offering hope or feeding an addiction? Our homeless goody bags are filled with practical things for daily use and more importantly include contact info for local agencies to assist with needs, as well as a scripture card of encouragement.

Socks, crackers, lip balm, small hygiene items, small packages of wrapped nuts, trail-mix, gum, tissues, and gallon zip bags are all needed. Stop by your favorite bulk food store and pick up a pack or two of something to donate. Your donations can be left in the Mission bins.

The trash-lined dirt road told me that we were close. This stop has become familiar, yet each visit always promises something unfamiliar. As we stepped out of the vehicle, my heart raced a bit with anticipation for what the next 30 minutes would hold. On my left was a two-story building that housed 25 kids and on my right, a tin-roof structure that was home to 15 or so women. These aren't your ordinary kids and women, though. Instead, these are the outcast, the abandoned, and the forgotten; a small group of orphans and widows in a small town in Hyderabad, India.


You could easily drive past and never know the broken and beautiful faces who occupy these homes; however, once you visit, their faces will be permanently etched in your heart and mind. Each time I leave this place, I leave full of sorrow and full of joy. That's a little confusing, isn't it? How can you

time I leave this place, I leave full of sorrow and full of joy. That's a little confusing, isn't it? How can you be both sorrow-filled and joy-filled at the same time? I can't explain it perfectly, but I can testify to their coexistence.

As we walked into the Widows home, my eyes met the familiar sting of smoke from the burning logs that would soon cook lunch. In seconds, I was smelling and seeing and hearing so many things. Quite frankly, in the kindest of ways, the experience is an assault on your senses. After quickly regaining my composure, I walked in and greeted each woman with a smile, a hug, and a small pack of cookies. The cookies seem too meager to even be called gifts, but they were received as tiny treasures.

"Praise the Lord" is the only language exchange we can make without an interpreter.

As we were finishing up our visit, I saw one lady sitting near the door. Her eyes looked so sad and tired. Her crushed spirit was on display for anyone who glanced her way. I knelt down and took hold of her hands. She began to weep. Then, she started to speak. Her words were translated: "I am so sad. Terribly sad and grief-stricken. Nobody comes to see me. I have family, but they don't come. I'm so sad. I'm so lonely. I'm



Her long, stringy gray hair got in the way of her tears as they poured out of her eyes. In that

moment, I felt like my words were exactly what she needed, almost like balm to her soul. This entire interaction was less than two minutes, but I just knew that it was divinely orchestrated by only a God such as ours, One who cares for us so personally and uniquely.

As my final words were being translated, a lady who helps out in the home walked by and said to me nonchalantly, "Ma'am, she's gone deaf. She can't hear a word you're saying."

I paused, awkwardly smiled, and then nodded my head. I turned back around to look at my new friend once more. I squeezed her hands and walked away.

Out of all the women there, I chose to have a conversation with the one who couldn't hear!

I was so confident that my words were exactly from God and exactly what she needed. But then God reminded me that often times, our presence is needed even more than our words.

I love words. I love to give them and receive them. My heart can be filled in an instant with honest, sincere words of affirmation. I'm constantly aware of the power of words, and I try to use them often to uplift and encourage others. Words are my thing. But that day, God reminded me of another gift, the gift of being present and near.

Leave it to God to sit me down on the ground in a Widows home in India with an interpreter to have a conversation with a deaf woman! Even when I knew exactly

what she needed, God knew even better. And still, in His ever-so-gracious-ways, He used me to communicate to a woman who was in desperate need of a gift that day.

I wonder how often I might miss out on the sweet and simple gift of presence when I think I need something different? Or even worse, how often might I miss an opportunity to be that gift to someone because I think I know exactly what's needed.

I pray that this would be a year that we would walk next door, drive across town, or perhaps fly to the ends of the earth to simply sit and be with someone.

And maybe one day, you too would speak words that fall on deaf ears but in the process, extend a nearness that nourishes a dry and parched heart.

Reaching Latinos


Here are 4 ways you can help:

Intertwined Family

God has revealed his love for vulnerable children. He delights in setting the lonely in families (Psalm 68:6) and commands us, as followers of Christ, to care for the least of these (Matthew 25:40).





Our mission is to come alongside those in the foster/adoptive community and serve

them in ways that point to the provision, love and care of Jesus.

Our vision is to become a ministry the RVA community relies on to provide practical resources, support and hope while stepping into the lives of vulnerable children & families.

We are not all called to do the same thing, we are all capable of doing something. What's your something?

Foster Care/Adoption: Foster care is provided when children are in homes experiencing a major crisis or difficulty, which may include abuse, neglect, substance abuse, a mental or physical health crisis, and/or lack of family support. Foster care is intended to be a short-term situation until a permanent placement can be made, preferably back with the biological parents. Unfortunately, some parents are unable to overcome the challenges they face. In these circumstances, parental rights may be terminated and the child(ren) becomes eligible for adoption. Adoption might also take the form of private/international placement through agencies other than local social services offices.

Wrap Around/Respite Teams: Wrapping around foster and adoptive families is critical to their success. When we leverage skills, talents and time to help, a foster or adoptive family is more likely to thrive. Running errands, babysitting, doing yard work, cleaning & delivering meals are just a few ways you can get involved. A respite family can be thought of as an "aunt and uncle" for children in foster care. They may provide shortterm care to give the foster family a needed break or provide care during a personal emergency.

Social Workers Support: Social workers are on the front lines serving children and families in crisis. Too often they are over-worked, under-compensated and completely forgotten. We want to love them and show how much we appreciate them in tangible ways.

Mentoring: Every year hundreds of youth age out of foster care without a permanent family and face overwhelming challenges. Homelessness, poverty, drug abuse, trafficking & incarceration are all too often the end result. A single caring adult can change the course of their lives. There are many ways to support older youth on their journey into adulthood.



Birth Family Support: No matter what has happened in the past, biological parents of children in care are not the enemy. In fact, we want to take steps and invest in their lives in ways that lead them to reunification with their children and prevention of future separation.

CASA: Henrico County Court Appointed Special Advocates, Inc (CASA) is a nonprofit agency committed to advocating for all abused children involved in the court process due to concerns for their safety and well-being. Henrico CASA recruits, screens, trains, and supervises local citizens who become volunteer advocates dedicated to representing the needs of abused and neglected children and children in need of services or supervision. The advocates promote safe permanent homes for all children.



We're going back to Guatemala, working with missionaries, Hector and Ruth Aragon, at a Child Hope School.
